

"California's attorney general is warning local businesses against sharing information illegally with Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agents ahead of a possible crackdown on immigrants in the state. In an announcement Thursday, Attorney General Xavier Becerra warned California businesses against voluntarily supplying ICE agents with their employees' information, violating their privacy rights. "No one but more specifically, employers — [can] voluntarily give up ... employees' rights to privacy," Becerra said. "If you do so, you are subjecting yourselves to fines - up to \$10,000 for violations. Ignorance of the law is no excuse if you violate it," he added. "Concerned about "rumors" of an imminent immigration enforcement sweep in California, state Atty. Gen. Xavier Becerra on Thursday warned employers he is prepared to seek fines if they violate a new state law that prohibits them from giving information on employees to federal authorities. Becerra said rumblings of possible sweeps compelled him to remind Californians that there are new laws restriction local law

restricting rocar ian enforcement cooperation with federal agents and that bar businesses from voluntarily allowing immigration officers to access or obtain employee records without a court order or subpoena. "It's important, given these rumors out there, to let people and more specifically employers know that if they voluntarily start giving up information about their employees in ways that contradict our new California laws they subject themselves to actions by my office or local prosecutors enforcing AB 450," he said at a news conference. He said employers who violate the new law face fines of up to \$10,000." (KTLA5)

"California Attorney General Xavier Becerra warned businesses on Thursday to keep quiet when talking to federal immigration authorities or face legal ramifications. Becerra, a Democrat, told California employers that if they assist federal immigration authorities in widespread sweeps they will be in violation of the state's new law, the Immigrant Worker Protection Act, which aims to protect workers regardless of immigration status. "It's important, given these rumors that are out there, to let people know - more specifically today, employers — that if they voluntarily start giving up

information about their employees or access to their employees in ways that contradict our new California laws, they subject themselves to actions by my office," Becerra said during a news conference, according to the Sacramento Bee. ATTORNEY GENERAL SESSIONS DELIVERS REMARKS AT THE 26TH ANNUAL LAW ENFORCEMENT LEGISLATIVE DAY HOSTED BY THE CALIFORNIA PEACE OFFICERS' ASSOCIATION

Sacramento, CA

We are simply asking California and other sanctuary jurisdictions to stop actively obstructing federal law enforcement.

Stop treating immigration agents differently from everybody else for the purpose of eviscerating border controls and advancing an open borders philosophy shared by only the most radical extremists. Stop protecting lawbreakers and giving all officers more dangerous work to do so that a few politicians can score political points on the backs of officer safety.

Remarks as prepared for delivery.

Thank you, Mark for that kind introduction, for your leadership with the CPOA, and most all for your 22 years of service in law enforcement.

I also want to thank all of the other law enforcement leaders who are here today:

- District Attorney Todd Riebe of the California District Attorneys Association, and
- Commissioner Warren Stanley of the California Highway Patrol.

It is a special honor to be with the California Peace Officers'
Association.

With nearly a century of history, and more than 16,000 members, CPOA represents the core of California's law enforcement community.

I know, first hand, the importance of the work that you do. I know its dangers, challenges, frustrations, and satisfactions. I have had years of firsthand experience working with your colleagues. And while I have inexpressible pride in our fabulous federal law officers, I am fully aware that 85 percent of all law enforcement officers are state, local, and tribal.

And I am well aware that the increased training, professionalism, leadership, and more effective enforcement policies of our departments nationwide, and over several decades, has been the critical factor in reversing the dramatic rise in crime that we saw throughout the 1970s.

Over a 22 year period, we saw homicide rates cut in half, youth drug use fall by almost half, and violent crime fall dramatically. It was an achievement few would have ever expected.

Much of the transformative leadership for this change arose from your former Governor and our President Ronald Reagan—aided by his fabulous California counselor and later Attorney General, Ed Meese.

Maybe in recent years we got complacent and took our eye off the ball, but recent trends are deeply worrisome.

In 2014 and 2015 violent crime stopped falling and jumped seven percent nationwide.

Homicide surged 20 percent, the largest increase since 1968. And drug availability rose dramatically, lethal purity reached unprecedented levels while prices fell. And along with the new killer drug, fentanyl, overdose deaths reached levels we have never seen before—66,000 deaths last year.

That is why on my first day in office, President Trump sent me three executive orders: (1) to back the women and men in blue, (2) to reduce crime in America, and (3) to dismantle transnational criminal gangs.

We at the Department of Justice embrace these goals. I know you do too.

Let me be explicit: our express goal is to reduce the violent crime rate, reduce the homicide rate, reduce the amount of opioids prescribed, and reduce overdose deaths.

Let's resolve to achieve these goals. Ours is not just a job, but our sworn duty, and for many of us, a high calling.

And a lawful immigration system that serves the national interest helps us achieve these goals and more. That's what we need to talk about today.

We are a strong, prosperous, and orderly nation. And such a nation must have a lawful system of immigration. I am not aware of any advanced nation that does not understand this fundamental tenet.

And let no one contend that we reject immigration and want to "wall off America" from all lawful immigration. President Trump and the American people know what's happening. We admit 1.1 million immigrants lawfully to permanent legal status—green card status—every year, the highest numbers in the world.

Indeed, at this unprecedented rate we will soon have the largest percentage of non-native born in our nation's history with the percentage continuing to rise every year thereafter.

Thus, the good and decent people of this country are right to insist that this country should end the illegality, create a rational immigration flow, and protect the nation from criminal aliens.

It cannot be that someone who illegally crosses the border and two days later arrives in Sacramento, Dubuque, Louisville, and Central Islip is home free—never to be removed.

It cannot be the policy of a great nation to up and reward those who unlawfully enter its country with legal status, Social Security, welfare, food stamps, and work permits. Meanwhile those who engage in this process lawfully and patiently and wait their turn are discriminated against at every turn.

Most Americans get this. They are working hard to make ends meet, follow the rules, and try to keep their loved ones safe.

They, our citizens, want our government to think about them for a change to consider their interests. They have dreams too.

Frankly, this commonsense concept was a key factor in President Trump's election. Elections have consequences.

Immigration law is the province of the federal government. This Administration and this Justice Department are determined to make it work effectively for the people.

I understand that we have a wide variety of political opinions out there on immigration. But the law is in the books and its purpose is clear.

There is no nullification. There is no secession. Federal law is "the supreme law of the land." I would invite any doubters to Gettysburg, and to the graves of John C. Calhoun and Abraham Lincoln.

A refusal to apprehend and deport those, especially the criminal element, effectively rejects all immigration law and creates an open borders system. Open borders is a radical, irrational idea that cannot be accepted.

The United States of America is not "an idea;" it is a secular nation-state with a Constitution, laws, and borders, all of which are designed to protect our nation's interests. Surely, we should be able to agree on this much.

To carry out the intent of our laws, we need law officers. We need

our Immigration and Customs Officers and our Customs and Border Patrol officers. They are your brothers and sisters. President Trump, the Congress, and the American people want them to accomplish the goals our laws set out for them. That's why we pay them.

But, California, we have a problem. A series of actions and events has occurred that directly and adversely impact the work of our federal officers.

For example, the mayor of Oakland has been actively seeking to help illegal aliens avoid apprehension by ICE. Her actions support those who flout our laws and boldly validate the illegality. There's no other way to interpret her remarks.

To make matters worse, the elected Lieutenant Governor of this state praised her for doing so. Bragging about and encouraging the obstruction of our law enforcement and the law is an embarrassment to this proud and important state.

Tom Homan, Acting Director of ICE has said that "being a law enforcement officer is already dangerous enough, but to give the criminals a heads up that we're coming in the next 24 hours increases that risk. I watch [the mayor's] statement when she said her priority is the safety of her community, but what she did has the exact opposite effect."

According to Acting Director Homan, ICE failed to make 800 arrests that they would have made if the mayor had not acted as she did.

Those are 800 wanted criminals that are now at large in that community—800 wanted criminals that ICE will now have to pursue with more difficulty in more dangerous situations, all because of one mayor's irresponsible action.

So here's my message to Mayor Schaaf: How dare you. How dare you needlessly endanger the lives of law enforcement just to promote your radical open borders agenda.

But in California, we have an even bigger problem than just one mayor. The problems continue.

For example, in January, Ventura County declined a request from ICE to hold an alien Ventura had arrested for continuous sexual abuse of a child. Instead of being removed from this country, he was released back into the community and now our federal law enforcement will need to find him and arrest him wherever he may be.

In recent years, California has enacted a number of laws designed to intentionally obstruct the work of our sworn immigration enforcement officers—to intentionally use every power it has to

undermine duly-established immigration law in America.

California won't let employers voluntarily allow ICE agents on their property. And California requires employers to give notice to employees before ICE inspects their workplace.

When this law was before the California General Assembly, a Judiciary Committee report explicitly stated that its goal was to frustrate "an expected increase in federal immigration enforcement actions."

ICE agents are federal law enforcement officers carrying out federal law. California cannot forbid them or obstruct them in doing their jobs.

Just imagine if a state passed a law forbidding employers from cooperating with OSHA in ensuring workplace safety. Or the EPA, looking for a polluter. That would obviously be absurd. But it would be no different in principle from this new law enacted by California.

And just think about the situation it puts California employers in.

They want to help law enforcement. They want to do their civic duty. We ought to encourage that.

But your state attorney general has repeatedly said his office will prosecute these business owners. Let me quote: "ignorance of the law is no excuse if you violate it" and "you are subjecting yourself to up to \$10,000 [in fines] for violations."

California has also claimed the authority to inspect facilities where ICE holds people in custody. Already this year, California has specifically and in a discriminatory manner targeted six facilities and demanded documents and other material from the Department of Homeland Security.

California won't let law enforcement officers like you transfer prisoners into ICE custody or even communicate with ICE that you're about to release someone they're looking for. Remember that California found these people dangerous enough to detain them in the first place, but then insists on releasing them back into the community instead of allowing federal officers to remove them.

And rather than allow ICE officers to do their jobs at the jailhouse, they force these officers to conduct far more dangerous arrests elsewhere—where violent criminals may reside and where children can be caught in the crossfire.

That's not just unconstitutional, it's a plain violation of federal statute and common sense.

Importantly, these laws are harmful to Californians, and they're especially harmful to law enforcement

That's why the Department of Justice has filed a lawsuit yesterday against the state of California to invalidate these unjust laws and to immediately freeze their effect. Federal agents must be able to do the job that Congress has directed them to do.

Contrary to what you might hear from the lawless open borders radicals, we are not asking California, Oakland, or anyone else to enforce immigration laws.

Although we would welcome the positive assistance the majority of jurisdictions in America provide, ICE agents do incredible work every day. They will not be deterred.

We are simply asking California and other sanctuary jurisdictions to stop actively obstructing federal law enforcement.

Stop treating immigration agents differently from everybody else for the purpose of eviscerating border controls and advancing an open borders philosophy shared by only the most radical extremists. Stop protecting lawbreakers and giving all officers more dangerous work to do so that a few politicians can score political points on the backs of officer safety.

You are professionals. You understand the risks involved.

Think about the officers knocking on a door to execute a warrant. They don't know what's on the other side. It's not fair to them to keep putting them in that situation by releasing criminal aliens into the community who shouldn't even be in the country. I sign condolence letters for law enforcement killed in the line of duty; I fundamentally reject, at my core, that we should further endanger the lives of those who risk everything for us just because some officials in California wants to violate the law in promotion of their radical agenda.

California is using every power it has—and some it doesn't—to frustrate federal law enforcement. So you can be sure I'm going to use every power I have to stop them.

We are going to fight these irrational, unfair, and unconstitutional policies that have been imposed on you and our federal officers. We are fighting to make your jobs safer and to help you reduce crime in America. We are fighting to have a lawful system of immigration that serves Americans. And we intend to win.

I want to close by reiterating my deep appreciation and profound thanks to all the women and men of law enforcement—federal, state, local, and tribal. The work that you do—that you have dedicated your lives to—is essential. I believe it. The Department of Justice believes it. And President Trump believes it.

You can be certain about this: we have your back and you have

our thanks.

JUSTICE DEPARTMENT FILES PREEMPTION LAWSUIT AGAINST THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA TO STOP INTERFERENCE WITH FEDERAL IMMIGRATION AUTHORITIES

WASHINGTON – In a speech to the California Peace Officers' Association's Legislative Day, Attorney General Jeff Sessions today announced that the Justice Department has filed a legal action against the State of California, Governor of California Jerry Brown, and Attorney General of California Xavier Becerra, seeking both declaratory and injunctive relief based upon the enactment and implementation of certain provisions of three California laws—Assembly Bill 450 (AB 450); Senate Bill 54 (SB 54); and Assembly Bill 103 (AB 103)—which intentionally obstruct and discriminate against the enforcement of federal immigration law. The complaint contends that the laws in question are preempted by federal law and impermissibly target the Federal Government, and therefore violate the Supremacy Clause of the United States Constitution. As a result, the Justice Department is seeking to permanently enjoin these state statutes, which are contrary to federal law and interfere with federal immigration authorities' ability to carry out their lawful duties. In addition, the Justice Department is continuing to review other related California enactments.

The complaint, accompanying motion for a preliminary injunction, and declarations from Department of Homeland Security and Department of State officials—filed last evening in the Eastern District of California—spell out in detail the extent to which each of these laws have interfered, and will continue to interfere, with federal law enforcement efforts.

AB 450 prohibits private employers from voluntarily cooperating with federal immigration officials—including officials conducting worksite enforcement efforts and other enforcement operations. It also requires that private employers notify employees in advance of a potential worksite enforcement inspection—despite clear federal law that has been on the books for approximately three decades that has no such requirements. An April 22, 2017, report on AB 450 compiled by the California State Assembly's Committee on Judiciary states that the law is designed to frustrate "an expected increase in federal immigration enforcement actions." California has demonstrated its intent to enforce this law: on Jan. 18,

2018, California Attorney General Becerra issued a warning to employers in the state that his office would "prosecute those who violate [AB 450] by voluntarily cooperating with Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) efforts."

Additionally, failure to comply with AB 450 could result in a fine for the business owner ranging from \$2,000-\$10,000. California employers are thus caught between what many may feel is a civic duty to cooperate with the enforcement of federal law, and a state government that penalizes such lawful cooperation.

SB 54 restricts state and local law enforcement officials from providing information to federal immigration authorities about the release date of removable criminal aliens who are in their custody. These criminal aliens are subject to removal from the United States under federal immigration law, and SB 54 interferes with federal immigration authorities' ability to carry out their responsibilities under federal law. SB 54 also violates 8 USC 1373, a law enacted by Congress, which promotes information sharing related to immigration enforcement. The state law also prohibits the actual transfer of criminal aliens to federal custody, which creates a dangerous operating environment for ICE agents executing arrests in non-custodial settings. In a declaration provided to the Court, ICE Deputy Director Thomas Homan states that these "at-large arrests...unquestionably involve a greater possibility of the use of force or violence by the target... and have greater access to weapons, exposing officers, the public, and the alien to greater risk of harm."

Remarkably, with this law California attempts to shield from federal law enforcement removable criminal aliens who have committed crimes in the state of California and across the country. In doing so, California is releasing onto its streets those removable criminal aliens who have already shown a willingness to engage in criminal activity—as evidenced by their state or local detention for violating state law—and who therefore are most likely to commit crimes in the future.

AB 103 imposes a state-run inspection and review scheme of the federal detention of aliens held in facilities pursuant to federal contracts. This includes review of immigration processes and the circumstances in which aliens were apprehended, and also requires access to privileged federal records that are under ICE's control. With this law, California is trying to regulate federal immigration detention, which it cannot do under the Constitution. California does not impose such an inspection and review scheme on other similar detention facilities that do not house civil immigration detainees—in other words, this is a special review regime that applies only to facilities that house civil immigration detainees. This different treatment shows that California is seeking to regulate the federal government, which is not permitted under well-established Supreme Court precedent.

"The Department of Justice and the Trump Administration are going to fight these unjust, unfair, and unconstitutional policies that have been imposed on you,"

Attorney General Jeff Sessions today told law enforcement officers attending the California Peace Officers Association's 26th Annual Law Enforcement Legislative Day, referencing AB 450, SB 54, and AB 103. "We are fighting to make your jobs safer and to help you reduce crime in America. And I believe that we are going to win."

"Our duty at the Department of Homeland Security is to enforce and uphold the nation's security laws as passed by the U.S. Congress and signed by the President," said Secretary Kirstjen M. Nielsen for the Department of Homeland Security. "California has chosen to purposefully contradict the will and responsibility of the Congress to protect our homeland. 

We are simply asking California and other sanctuary jurisdictions to stop actively obstructing federal law enforcement.

Stop treating immigration agents differently from everybody else for the purpose of eviscerating border controls and advancing an open borders philosophy shared by only the most radical extremists. Stop protecting lawbreakers and giving all officers more dangerous work to do so that a few politicians can score political points on the backs of officer safety.

Remarks as prepared for delivery.

Thank you, Mark for that kind introduction, for your leadership with the CPOA, and most all for your 22 years of service in law enforcement.

I also want to thank all of the other law enforcement leaders who are here today:

- Chief Ed Medrano of the California Police Chiefs Association
- Mark Brewster of the California Narcotic Officers Association
- District Attorney Todd Riebe of the California District Attorneys Association, and
- Commissioner Warren Stanley of the California Highway Patrol.

It is a special honor to be with the California Peace Officers' Association.

With nearly a century of history, and more than 16,000 members, CPOA represents the core of California's law enforcement community.

I know, first hand, the importance of the work that you do. I know its dangers, challenges, frustrations, and satisfactions. I have had years of firsthand experience working with your colleagues. And while I have inexpressible pride in our fabulous federal law officers, I am fully aware that 85 percent of all law enforcement officers are state, local, and tribal.

And I am well aware that the increased training, professionalism, leadership, and more effective enforcement policies of our departments nationwide, and over several decades, has been the critical factor in reversing the dramatic rise in crime that we saw throughout the 1970s.

Over a 22 year period, we saw homicide rates cut in half, youth drug use fall by almost half, and violent crime fall dramatically. It was an achievement few would have ever expected.

Much of the transformative leadership for this change arose from your former Governor and our President Ronald Reagan—aided by his fabulous California counselor and later Attorney General, Ed Meese.

Maybe in recent years we got complacent and took our eye off the ball, but recent trends are deeply worrisome.

In 2014 and 2015 violent crime stopped falling and jumped seven percent nationwide.

Homicide surged 20 percent, the largest increase since 1968. And drug availability rose dramatically, lethal purity reached unprecedented levels while prices fell. And along with the new killer drug, fentanyl, overdose deaths reached levels we have never seen before—66,000 deaths last year.

That is why on my first day in office, President Trump sent me three executive orders: (1) to back the women and men in blue, (2) to reduce crime in America, and (3) to dismantle transnational criminal gangs.

We at the Department of Justice embrace these goals. I know you do too.

Let me be explicit: our express goal is to reduce the violent crime rate, reduce the

homicide rate, reduce the amount of opioids prescribed, and reduce overdose deaths.

Let's resolve to achieve these goals. Ours is not just a job, but our sworn duty, and for many of us, a high calling.

And a lawful immigration system that serves the national interest helps us achieve these goals and more. That's what we need to talk about today.

We are a strong, prosperous, and orderly nation. And such a nation must have a lawful system of immigration. I am not aware of any advanced nation that does not understand this fundamental tenet.

And let no one contend that we reject immigration and want to "wall off America" from all lawful immigration. President Trump and the American people know what's happening. We admit 1.1 million immigrants lawfully to permanent legal status—green card status—every year, the highest numbers in the world.

Indeed, at this unprecedented rate we will soon have the largest percentage of non-native born in our nation's history with the percentage continuing to rise every year thereafter.

Thus, the good and decent people of this country are right to insist that this country should end the illegality, create a rational immigration flow, and protect the nation from criminal aliens.

It cannot be that someone who illegally crosses the border and two days later arrives in Sacramento, Dubuque, Louisville, and Central Islip is home free—never to be removed.

It cannot be the policy of a great nation to up and reward those who unlawfully enter its country with legal status, Social Security, welfare, food stamps, and work permits. Meanwhile those who engage in this process lawfully and patiently and wait their turn are discriminated against at every turn.

Most Americans get this. They are working hard to make ends meet, follow the rules, and try to keep their loved ones safe.

They, our citizens, want our government to think about them for a change to consider their interests. They have dreams too. Frankly, this commonsense concept was a key factor in President Trump's election. Elections have consequences.

Immigration law is the province of the federal government This Administration

and this Justice Department are determined to make it work effectively for the people.

I understand that we have a wide variety of political opinions out there on immigration. But the law is in the books and its purpose is clear.

There is no nullification. There is no secession. Federal law is "the supreme law of the land." I would invite any doubters to Gettysburg, and to the graves of John C. Calhoun and Abraham Lincoln.

A refusal to apprehend and deport those, especially the criminal element, effectively rejects all immigration law and creates an open borders system. Open borders is a radical, irrational idea that cannot be accepted.

The United States of America is not "an idea;" it is a secular nation-state with a Constitution, laws, and borders, all of which are designed to protect our nation's interests. Surely, we should be able to agree on this much.

To carry out the intent of our laws, we need law officers. We need our Immigration and Customs Officers and our Customs and Border Patrol officers. They are your brothers and sisters. President Trump, the Congress, and the American people want them to accomplish the goals our laws set out for them. That's why we pay them.

But, California, we have a problem. A series of actions and events has occurred that directly and adversely impact the work of our federal officers.

For example, the mayor of Oakland has been actively seeking to help illegal aliens avoid apprehension by ICE. Her actions support those who flout our laws and boldly validate the illegality. There's no other way to interpret her remarks.

To make matters worse, the elected Lieutenant Governor of this state praised her for doing so. Bragging about and encouraging the obstruction of our law enforcement and the law is an embarrassment to this proud and important state.

Tom Homan, Acting Director of ICE has said that "being a law enforcement officer is already dangerous enough, but to give the criminals a heads up that we're coming in the next 24 hours increases that risk. I watch [the mayor's] statement when she said her priority is the safety of her community, but what she did has the exact opposite effect."

According to Acting Director Homan, ICE failed to make 800 arrests that they would have made if the mayor had not acted as she did.

Those are 800 wanted criminals that are now at large in that community—800 wanted criminals that ICE will now have to pursue with more difficulty in more dangerous situations, all because of one mayor's irresponsible action.

So here's my message to Mayor Schaaf: How dare you. How dare you needlessly endanger the lives of law enforcement just to promote your radical open borders agenda.

But in California, we have an even bigger problem than just one mayor. The problems continue.

For example, in January, Ventura County declined a request from ICE to hold an alien Ventura had arrested for continuous sexual abuse of a child. Instead of being removed from this country, he was released back into the community and now our federal law enforcement will need to find him and arrest him wherever he may be.

In recent years, California has enacted a number of laws designed to intentionally obstruct the work of our sworn immigration enforcement officers—to intentionally use every power it has to undermine duly-established immigration law in America.

California won't let employers voluntarily allow ICE agents on their property.

And California requires employers to give notice to employees before ICE inspects their workplace.

When this law was before the California General Assembly, a Judiciary Committee report explicitly stated that its goal was to frustrate "an expected increase in federal immigration enforcement actions."

ICE agents are federal law enforcement officers carrying out federal law. California cannot forbid them or obstruct them in doing their jobs.

Just imagine if a state passed a law forbidding employers from cooperating with OSHA in ensuring workplace safety. Or the EPA, looking for a polluter. That would obviously be absurd. But it would be no different in principle from this new law enacted by California.

And just think about the situation it puts California employers in. They want to help law enforcement. They want to do their civic duty. We ought to encourage that.

But your state attorney general has repeatedly said his office will prosecute these

business owners. Let me quote: "ignorance of the law is no excuse if you violate it" and "you are subjecting yourself to up to \$10,000 [in fines] for violations."

California has also claimed the authority to inspect facilities where ICE holds people in custody. Already this year, California has specifically and in a discriminatory manner targeted six facilities and demanded documents and other material from the Department of Homeland Security.

California won't let law enforcement officers like you transfer prisoners into ICE custody or even communicate with ICE that you're about to release someone they're looking for. Remember that California found these people dangerous enough to detain them in the first place, but then insists on releasing them back into the community instead of allowing federal officers to remove them.

And rather than allow ICE officers to do their jobs at the jailhouse, they force these officers to conduct far more dangerous arrests elsewhere—where violent criminals may reside and where children can be caught in the crossfire.

That's not just unconstitutional, it's a plain violation of federal statute and common sense.

Importantly, these laws are harmful to Californians, and they're especially harmful to law enforcement.

That's why the Department of Justice has filed a lawsuit yesterday against the state of California to invalidate these unjust laws and to immediately freeze their effect. Federal agents must be able to do the job that Congress has directed them to do.

Contrary to what you might hear from the lawless open borders radicals, we are not asking California, Oakland, or anyone else to enforce immigration laws.

Although we would welcome the positive assistance the majority of jurisdictions in America provide, ICE agents do incredible work every day. They will not be deterred.

We are simply asking California and other sanctuary jurisdictions to stop actively obstructing federal law enforcement.

You are professionals. You understand the risks involved.

Think about the officers knocking on a door to execute a warrant. They don't know what's on the other side. It's not fair to them to keep putting them in that situation by releasing criminal aliens into the community who shouldn't even be in the country. I sign condolence letters for law enforcement killed in the line of duty; I fundamentally reject, at my core, that we should further endanger the lives of those who risk everything for us just because some officials in California wants to violate the law in promotion of their radical agenda.

California is using every power it has—and some it doesn't—to frustrate federal law enforcement. So you can be sure I'm going to use every power I have to stop them.

We are going to fight these irrational, unfair, and unconstitutional policies that have been imposed on you and our federal officers. We are fighting to make your jobs safer and to help you reduce crime in America. We are fighting to have a lawful system of immigration that serves Americans. And we intend to win.

I want to close by reiterating my deep appreciation and profound thanks to all the women and men of law enforcement—federal, state, local, and tribal. The work that you do—that you have dedicated your lives to—is essential. I believe it. The Department of Justice believes it. And President Trump believes it.

You can be certain about this: we have your back and you have our thanks.

Fox has the letter first and, have reached out to FBI and DOJ for comment.

The FBI may have violated criminal statutes by using unverified evidence during the 2016 election to obtain a surveillance warrant for Trump campaign aide Carter Page, the chairman of the House Intelligence Committee charged in Thursday in a letter obtained by Fox News.

House Intelligence Committee Chairman Devin Nunes, R-Calif., wrote in his letter to Attorney General Jeff Sessions that "in this instance, it's clear that basic operating guidance was violated."

Nunes cites the Domestic Investigations and Operations Guide (DIOG), which was created by the bureau and approved by the Justice Department, to say he believes the FBI violated procedures requiring verified and documented evidence in applications to the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Court.

An Oct. 2011 version of the operations guide states that the "accuracy of information contained within FISA applications is of utmost importance... Only documented and verified information may be used to support FBI applications to the court."

It also states that information in a FISA application must be "thoroughly vetted and confirmed."

Dear Mr. Attorney General:

The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) is charged with protecting the American people and enforcing our laws in accordance with the U.S. Constitution. To carry out this essential mission, the FBI has a strict set of internal rules and procedures embodied in the Domestic Investigations and Operations Guide (DIOG). The DIOG was created by the Bureau itself and approved by the Department of Justice (DOJ).

The latest unreduced version of the DIOG available to the Committee (dated October 15, 2011) delineates procedures the FBI must follow when submitting applications to the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Court (FISC) for orders to conduct surveillance through the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA). According to the DIOG:

- FISA surveillance is a very intrusive means of acquiring information that must balance the need to obtain sensitive national security information against civil liberties.
- When striking this balance, a verification process must be conducted for all FISA applications.
 - Under the subsection "FISA Verification of Accuracy Procedures," the FBI itself acknowledges this importance: "The accuracy of information contained within FISA applications is of utmost importance.... Only documented and verified information may be used to support FBI applications [FISA] to the court [FISC]."
- The DIOG provides detailed instructions for the FBI to follow to ensure that information
 appearing in a FISA application that is presented to the FISC has been thoroughly vetted
 and confirmed.

Former and current DOJ and FBI leadership have confirmed to the Committee that unverified information from the Steele dossier comprised an essential part of the FISA applications related to Carter Page. These details are outlined in a declassified memorandum released by the Committee on February 2, 2018, a copy of which is attached for your review.

In light of what appears to be a clear violation of FBI protocols, the Committee directs that DOJ shall, **no later than March 8, 2018**, provide answers to the following questions:

- Were these protocols changed after the 2011 version to allow for the use of unverified information to support FBI FISA applications to the FISC?
- If not, what steps has the DOJ and/or the FBI taken to hold accountable those officials who violated these protocols?

I will remind you that aside from the violation of these protocols, the presentation of false and/or unverified information to the FISC in connection with the Carter Page warrant applications could entail violations of the following criminal statutes:

- 18 USC 242
- 50 USC 1809
- Conspiracy
- · Obstruction of justice
- Contempt of Court

The FBI DIOG provides internal oversight and controls over authorized FBI activities so the American public can be assured the Bureau is conducting its vital mission in accordance with law and established guidelines. However, in this instance, it's clear that basic operating guidance was violated.

Congressional oversight is designed to hold agencies accountable. I trust that you share this view, and will assist the Committee's investigation into violations of DIOG procedures related to the use of the Steele dossier in FISA applications.

Federal Bureau of Investigation

Purpose

This memorandum provides Members an update on significant facts relating to the Committee's ongoing investigation into the Department of Justice (DOJ) and Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and their use of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA) during the 2016 presidential election cycle. Our findings, which are detailed below, 1) raise concerns with the legitimacy and legality of certain DOJ and FBI interactions with the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Court (FISC), and 2) represent a troubling breakdown of legal processes established to protect the American people from abuses related to the FISA process.

Investigation Update

On October 21, 2016, DOJ and FBI sought and received a FISA probable cause order (not under Title VII) authorizing electronic surveillance on Carter Page from the FISC. Page is a U.S. citizen who served as a volunteer advisor to the Trump presidential campaign. Consistent with requirements under FISA, the application had to be first certified by the Director or Deputy Director of the FBI. It then required the approval of the Attorney General, Deputy Attorney General (DAG), or the Senate-confirmed Assistant Attorney General for the National Security Division.

The FBI and DOJ obtained one initial FISA warrant targeting Carter Page and three FISA renewals from the FISC. As required by statute (50 U.S.C. §1805(d)(1)), a FISA order on an American citizen must be renewed by the FISC every 90 days and each renewal requires a separate finding of probable cause. Then-Director James Comey signed three FISA applications in question on behalf of the FBI, and Deputy Director Andrew McCabe signed one. Then-DAG Sally Yates, then-Acting DAG Dana Boente, and DAG Rod Rosenstein each signed one or more FISA applications on behalf of DOJ.

Due to the sensitive nature of foreign intelligence activity, FISA submissions (including renewals) before the FISC are classified. As such, the public's confidence in the integrity of the FISA process depends on the court's ability to hold the government to the highest standard—particularly as it relates to surveillance of American citizens. However, the FISC's rigor in protecting the rights of Americans, which is reinforced by 90-day renewals of surveillance orders, is necessarily dependent on the government's production to the court of all material and relevant facts. This should include information potentially favorable to the target of the FISA

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application that is known by the government. In the case of Carter Page, the government had at least four independent opportunities before the FISC to accurately provide an accounting of the relevant facts. However, our findings indicate that, as described below, material and relevant information was omitted.

- 1) The "dossier" compiled by Christopher Steele (Steele dossier) on behalf of the Democratic National Committee (DNC) and the Hillary Clinton campaign formed an essential part of the Carter Page FISA application. Steele was a longtime FBI source who was paid over \$160,000 by the DNC and Clinton campaign, via the law firm Perkins Coie and research firm Fusion GPS, to obtain derogatory information on Donald Trump's ties to Russia.
 - a) Neither the initial application in October 2016, nor any of the renewals, disclose or reference the role of the DNC, Clinton campaign, or any party/campaign in funding Steele's efforts, even though the political origins of the Steele dossier were then known to senior DOJ and FBI officials.
 - b) The initial FISA application notes Steele was working for a named U.S. person, but does not name Fusion GPS and principal Glenn Simpson, who was paid by a U.S. law firm (Perkins Coie) representing the DNC (even though it was known by DOJ at the time that political actors were involved with the Steele dossier). The application does not mention Steele was ultimately working on behalf of—and paid by—the DNC and Clinton campaign, or that the FBI had separately authorized payment to Steele for the same information.
- 2) The Carter Page FISA application also cited extensively a September 23, 2016, Yahoo News article by Michael Isikoff, which focuses on Page's July 2016 trip to Moscow. This article does not corroborate the Steele dossier because it is derived from information leaked by Steele himself to Yahoo News. The Page FISA application incorrectly assesses that Steele did not directly provide information to Yahoo News. Steele has admitted in British court filings that he met with Yahoo News—and several other outlets—in September 2016 at the direction of Fusion GPS. Perkins Coie was aware of Steele's initial media contacts because they hosted at least one meeting in Washington D.C. in 2016 with Steele and Fusion GPS where this matter was discussed.
 - a) Steele was suspended and then terminated as an FBI source for what the FBI defines as the most serious of violations—an unauthorized disclosure to the media of his relationship with the FBI in an October 30, 2016, *Mother Jones* article by David Corn. Steele should have been terminated for his previous undisclosed contacts with Yahoo and other outlets in September—before the Page application was submitted to

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- the FISC in October—but Steele improperly concealed from and lied to the FBI about those contacts.
- b) Steele's numerous encounters with the media violated the cardinal rule of source handling—maintaining confidentiality—and demonstrated that Steele had become a less than reliable source for the FBI.
- 3) Before and after Steele was terminated as a source, he maintained contact with DOJ via then-Associate Deputy Attorney General Bruce Ohr, a senior DOJ official who worked closely with Deputy Attorneys General Yates and later Rosenstein. Shortly after the election, the FBI began interviewing Ohr, documenting his communications with Steele. For example, in September 2016, Steele admitted to Ohr his feelings against then-candidate Trump when Steele said he "was desperate that Donald Trump not get elected and was passionate about him not being president." This clear evidence of Steele's bias was recorded by Ohr at the time and subsequently in official FBI files—but not reflected in any of the Page FISA applications.
 - a) During this same time period, Ohr's wife was employed by Fusion GPS to assist in the cultivation of opposition research on Trump. Ohr later provided the FBI with all of his wife's opposition research, paid for by the DNC and Clinton campaign via Fusion GPS. The Ohrs' relationship with Steele and Fusion GPS was inexplicably concealed from the FISC.
- 4) According to the head of the FBI's counterintelligence division, Assistant Director Bill Priestap, corroboration of the Steele dossier was in its "infancy" at the time of the initial Page FISA application. After Steele was terminated, a source validation report conducted by an independent unit within FBI assessed Steele's reporting as only minimally corroborated. Yet, in early January 2017, Director Comey briefed President-elect Trump on a summary of the Steele dossier, even though it was—according to his June 2017 testimony—"salacious and unverified." While the FISA application relied on Steele's past record of credible reporting on other unrelated matters, it ignored or concealed his anti-Trump financial and ideological motivations. Furthermore, Deputy Director McCabe testified before the Committee in December 2017 that no surveillance warrant would have been sought from the FISC without the Steele dossier information.

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5) The Page FISA application also mentions information regarding fellow Trump campaign advisor George Papadopoulos, but there is no evidence of any cooperation or conspiracy between Page and Papadopoulos. The Papadopoulos information triggered the opening of an FBI counterintelligence investigation in late July 2016 by FBI agent Pete Strzok. Strzok was reassigned by the Special Counsel's Office to FBI Human Resources for improper text messages with his mistress, FBI Attorney Lisa Page (no known relation to Carter Page), where they both demonstrated a clear bias against Trump and in favor of Clinton, whom Strzok had also investigated. The Strzok/Lisa Page texts also reflect extensive discussions about the investigation, orchestrating leaks to the media, and include a meeting with Deputy Director McCabe to discuss an "insurance" policy against President Trump's election.





JUSTICE DEPARTMENT LAUNCHES INITIATIVE TO FIGHT SEXUAL HARASSMENT IN THE WORKPLACE

WASHINGTON – The Justice Department's Civil Rights Division today announced a second initiative to combat sexual harassment; the effort announced today—the Sexual Harassment in the Workplace Initiative (SHWI)—focuses on workplace sexual harassment in the public sector.

The Justice Department's Civil Rights Division enforces Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 against state and local government employers. The law prohibits discrimination in employment on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, and religion. Sexual harassment is among the conduct prohibited by the law because it is a form of sex discrimination.

The Justice Department will also announce its first enforcement action brought under the SHWI. The Justice Department will file a lawsuit against the City of Houston, alleging that the Houston Fire Department (HFD) discriminated against two female firefighters on the basis of sex in violation of Title VII when it allowed them to be subjected to sexual harassment in the workplace.

As part of the Initiative, the Justice Department will continue to bring sex discrimination claims against state and local government employers with a renewed emphasis on sexual harassment charges. The Department will also work to develop effective remedial measures that can be used to hold public sector employers accountable where Title VII violations have been found, including identifying changes to existing employer practices and policies that will result in safe work environments.

Through the Initiative, the Department will also conduct outreach to state and local government employers that centers around five critical areas: (1) creating trusted and safe avenues for employees to report sexual harassment; (2) ensuring management support for anti-discrimination policies and practices; (3) implementing accountability measures to ensure the timely and effective resolution of sexual harassment complaints; (4) adopting comprehensive anti-sexual harassment policies and procedures that include regular, tailored, and interactive training for employees; and (5) providing safeguards against retaliation for persons who report sexual harassment and for employees who support them.

"All Americans are entitled to work with dignity in a place that is free of sexual harassment," said Acting Assistant Attorney General John Gore for the Civil Rights Division, in announcing the Initiative. "Through enforcement actions, effective remedial measures, and outreach, the Justice Department—under Attorney General Jeff Sessions' leadership—will fight to eliminate sexual harassment among public sector employers."

The creation of this Initiative reflects the Department of Justice's commitment to the aggressive enforcement of the nation's anti-discrimination laws and an expansion of the Civil Rights Division's efforts to eradicate sexual harassment under the leadership of Attorney General Jeff Sessions

In October 2017, the Justice Department <u>announced</u> the Civil Rights Division's first initiative to combat sexual harassment, the <u>Sexual Harassment in Housing Initiative</u>. In 2017, the Justice Department recovered more than \$1 million in damages for victims of harassment in housing. Many instances of sexual harassment in housing continue to go unreported. The Justice Department's investigations frequently uncover sexual harassment that has been ongoing for years or decades and identify numerous victims who never reported the conduct to federal authorities.

Municipal ID cards that Mayor Rahm Emanuel is launching for undocumented immigrants and others will be a valid form of identification for people both registering to vote and voting in Chicago, according to a letter aldermen received Friday.

Clerk Anna Valencia, who's heading up the CityKey program, cited state election rules to explain why the Chicago Board of Election Commissioners will accept the card.

"The Illinois Election Code requires the Board of Elections to accept current, valid photo identification cards and other local governmental documentation that includes an individual's name and address, as proof of identity and residency," Valencia's letter reads in part. "The CityKey fits both of these requirements."

The municipal ID is not yet available to the general public, but Valencia has said it will be in the spring. Most aldermen voted in favor of the program, which is viewed in City Hall circles as a way for Emanuel to boost his standing with Hispanic voters and immigrant rights supporters as he preps a 2019 re-election bid.

But a handful of City Council members are vehemently opposed to the cards. Northwest Side Ald. Nick Sposato, 38th, said he was "beyond disappointed" Valencia opted to make the cards a valid ID for voting.

Sposato pointed out the city is not planning to keep any of the background information applicants provide to establish their home addresses, so undocumented immigrants aren't afraid federal immigration agents can use the data to track them down.

"I'm not sure of the validity of this," Sposato said. "They may not have citizenship. Voter fraud would be my biggest concern."

And far Northwest Side Ald. Anthony Napolitano, who like Sposato represents a ward that's home to lots of city workers, called on Valencia to appear before aldermen to explain why she thinks it's appropriate to use the ID for voting.

"This was portrayed to us as a way for people to get basic services," said Napolitano, 41st. "This is exactly what we were concerned about and we raised those concerns with the clerk. I know I have colleagues who would not be on board with this.

City Council Latino Caucus Chairman Ald. Gilbert Villegas said he doesn't foresee the municipal ID leading to widespread fraud.

"It's not changing the state law, and there's nothing stopping someone from getting a fake ID now and going to try to vote," said Villegas, 36th.

Valencia's letter notes that voters currently aren't required to prove they are American citizens under state law. They simply must attest to their citizenship.

Valencia spokeswoman Kate LeFurgy said the clerk's office consulted with city elections officials before determining the cards pass muster as one of the many types of identification that can be used as voter ID.

"We want to underscore that if you are undocumented, it is illegal to vote even with any of the documents accepted as proof of identity or residency under the Illinois Election Code — everything from a debit card, utility bill or union card," LeFurgy said in an email.

Valencia has said the city will make the municipal card appealing to people other than those who have trouble getting state ID cards — such as those in the country illegally, homeless people and those recently released from prison. But it's still unclear exactly what types of broader benefits the ID will provide.

The city has announced residents will be able to use the IDs in place of both Chicago Public Library cards and CTA Ventra fare cards. Valencia also hopes to be able to announce deals with cultural institutions to allow cardholders to get discounts or other perks. Those have not yet been revealed.

The first 100,000 cards issued this year will be free. It remains to be seen whether the Chicago program approaches that number. While New York issued about 1 million IDNYC cards in two years, just 30,000 people received SF City ID Cards in San Francisco between 2009 and early 2017.

After the initial giveaway, Chicago's cards will cost \$10 for adults and \$5 for those 17 and younger. Seniors will be able to get the cards free, as will former inmates, domestic violence survivors and veterans.

The list of the documents the city will accept from people to establish their identities and residency is long, and includes driver's licenses and state IDs. Applicants will also be able to show expired foreign passports, foreign driver's licenses, high school or GED diplomas, and dozens of other forms to help establish identity.

To prove city residency, applicants will be able to show jury summonses, IRS forms, bank account statements and several other documents with Chicago addresses.





Dear Mr. Waxman:

I write to notify you of the United States' determination that Harvard is not complying with its Title VI access requirements, and that Harvard's actions indicate that this noncompliance cannot be corrected by informal means. See 28 C.F.R. § 42.108(a). At Harvard's request, several Department of Justice attorneys met with you and other representatives of Harvard on September 11, 2017. At that meeting, Harvard's representatives offered to work collaboratively to provide the United States with access to materials to which it is entitled under Title VI, the implementing regulations, and the governing law. Harvard, however, subsequently responded to the Department's informal attempts to obtain documents with delays and challenges to the Department's authority. The Department therefore sent a formal document request on October 19, 2017, with a deadline for compliance of November 2. You sent a belated response on November 7 that again challenged our authority to investigate Harvard and proposed providing the United States only restricted access to limited documents in contravention of Harvard's Title VI obligations. We responded separately to that unacceptable proposal today.

More than two months have passed since our September meeting, and Harvard has not yet produced a single document. We sincerely hope that Harvard will quickly correct its noncompliance and return to its collaborative approach. In a further effort to secure voluntary compliance, the Department will give Harvard until December 1, 2017, to comply with its October 19 document request. As we indicated in our separate response letter today, Department lawyers are willing to travel to your law firm or Cambridge to copy and download all of the documents and information that the Department requested in the formats in which it requested them. Please be advised that if Harvard does not comply with the document request in full by that deadline, we may file a lawsuit to enforce Harvard's Title VI access obligations. 28 C.F.R. § 42.108(d).

Dear Mr. Waxman:

I write in response to your November 7, 2017, letter that came five days after the November 2 deadline for Harvard to comply with the Department of Justice's first written document request. Rather than provide the documents and materials that the Department requested, your letter again erroneously challenges our authority to investigate Harvard under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and proposes an unacceptable plan to provide the United States restricted access to limited documents. *See* Letter from Seth P. Waxman, Harvard Counsel, to Matthew J. Donnelly, Civil Rights Division (Nov. 7, 2017) ("Waxman Nov. 7, 2017, Letter").

Nothing in your letter affects, much less eliminates, Harvard's obligation to provide the requested documents as a condition of its receipt of Title VI funding from the Department. Moreover, Harvard has these documents readily available because it already has produced them to the plaintiffs in *Students for Fair Admissions, Inc. v. President and Fellows of Harvard College (Harvard Corporation)*, No. 14cv14176 (D. Mass.) ("SFFA" suit). Indeed, at our September 11, 2017, meeting, Harvard suggested that the Department participate as *amicus curiae* in that case and offered to work collaboratively to provide the Department with access to those documents. Yet in the intervening two months, Harvard has pursued a strategy of delay and has not yet produced even a single document.

Accordingly, the Department is left with no choice but to conclude that Harvard is out of compliance with its Title VI access obligations. The Department therefore is simultaneously serving Harvard with a separate notice of this determination.

I. The Department Has Authority To Request the Documents, and Harvard Is Obliged To Comply with Those Requests

Your letter does not dispute that Harvard receives Title VI funding from the Department. Your letter also does not dispute that, as a condition of that funding, Harvard agreed to provide the Department with broad-ranging access to documents regarding Harvard's admissions policy

and practices. Your letter therefore makes no serious effort to dispute the dispositive point: that the Department has authority to request the documents it seeks and that Harvard is obliged to comply with those requests. In fact, your letter expresses that "Harvard is committed to meeting its responsibilities under Title VI, the relevant federal grants, and associated law." Waxman Nov. 7, 2017, Letter at 2.

Your letter nonetheless attempts to side-step Harvard's Title VI obligations. In particular, while your letter does not challenge the Department's authority to conduct this investigation, it once again challenges the Civil Rights Division's involvement in the investigation. This challenge again sails wide of the mark. First, your letter requests the date and source of the Department's delegation of authority to the Civil Rights Division to conduct this investigation. *Id.* at 1-2. The authority to conduct this investigation was properly delegated to the Civil Rights Division before the investigation was opened. That delegation followed the Department's longstanding internal delegation protocols that govern assignment of Title VI responsibilities. Your colleague Mr. Driscoll may be aware of the protocols in place when he worked for the Division.

Second, your letter again requests information on any complaints regarding Harvard's admissions policy and practices that underlie the Department's investigation. Waxman Nov. 7, 2017, Letter at 2. The subject matter of the *SFFA* suit captures the subject matter of any complaints the Department is investigating. Moreover, as the Department previously stated, beyond the publicly-available complaint that the Department already shared with you, the Department will not supply any other complaints it may be investigating because the release may interfere with an active investigation. *E.g.*, Letter from Mathew J. Donnelly, Civil Rights Division, to Seth P. Waxman, Harvard Counsel at 2 n.1 (Oct. 19, 2017) ("Donnelly Oct. 19, 2017, Letter").

Third, your letter asks whether the "Title VI Investigation Procedures Manual" is current. Waxman Nov. 7, 2017, Letter at 2. As I previously explained, that Manual was written to aid other agencies conducting Title VI investigations and does not constrain the Civil Rights Division's investigations or create any legal rights in any member of the public. Donnelly Oct. 19, 2017, Letter at 2. Your request thus misses the point: if you are looking for the current procedures governing the Division's Title VI investigations, I direct you to the Department's Title VI regulations.

Finally, your letter reiterates your previous irregular requests for the Department's communications with outside groups and our "investigative case files." Waxman Nov. 7, 2017, Letter at 2. For obvious reasons, the Department of Justice generally does not share its civil investigative case files with the targets of its investigations. The Department therefore will not respond to these irregular requests because a response could interfere with the investigation. My understanding is that the Department would give you the same response if you made your irregular requests under the Freedom of Information Act ("FOIA"), 5 U.S.C. § 522, but you may make an official FOIA request through the normal Department procedures if you would like an official FOIA response.

II. Harvard's Proposed Access Plan Is Inconsistent with Harvard's Obligations and Improperly Limits the Department's Rightful Access to Documents

Your letter also proposes providing restricted access to a subset of the documents the Department has requested, but your proposal is inconsistent with Harvard's Title VI obligations and improperly limits the Department's rightful access to documents. First, Harvard improperly attempts to limit the scope of its production, indicating that it will not produce to the Department important database information that it already has produced to the private plaintiffs in the *SFFA* suit. Waxman Nov. 7, 2017, Letter at 3. Harvard, however, identifies no authority for limiting its Title VI obligations in this manner. Nor could it: this database already has been deemed relevant and subject to production in the private litigation. And expert reports describing that database, *see id.*, are no substitute for the database itself.

Second, your proposal also states that, despite the Department's request for unredacted copies, Harvard will produce only documents with the redactions for "relevance" and "privacy" that Harvard used for its production set to the private plaintiff in the SFFA suit. Id. The Department, however, is not subject to those redaction requirements, and nothing in Title VI, the implementing regulations, or the governing law restricts the Department's access to only portions of documents that the funding recipient deems appropriate. Quite to the contrary: for obvious reasons, Title VI does not allow entities under investigation to dictate what information qualifies as relevant to the investigation.

Third, Harvard suggests that it will not provide copies of documents to the Department unless the Department shows a "demonstrated need for copies of certain documents" and "explore[s]" entering into a confidentiality agreement acceptable to Harvard. *Id.* But Harvard has no right to demand, much less determine, a "demonstrated need" for the documents that Title VI already requires it to produce or a confidentiality agreement. Indeed, the Department is under no obligation to, and ordinarily does not, enter into confidentiality agreements with any entity subject to a Title VI investigation.

There is no need to do so here: as the Department already has explained, the Department routinely protects confidential information in its investigations, shares Harvard's interest in shielding private information from public disclosure, and will take all appropriate measures to do so here. Donnelly Oct. 19, 2017, Letter at 3. Indeed, several federal statutes that we previously provided you already protect from disclosure the information that Harvard seeks to safeguard. *Id.* (citing FOIA; Privacy Act of 1974, 5 U.S.C. § 552; Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, 20 U.S.C. § 1232g(b)(3)). Your letter, however, omits any mention of those statutes, and offers no explanation as to why they are inadequate to protect confidential information in this investigation.

Finally, Harvard indicates that it will not provide copies of the requested documents, but will allow the Division to access the documents at your law firm "during normal business hours on mutually convenient dates." Waxman Nov. 7, 2017, Letter at 3. If your position is that our Title VI regulations do not require Harvard to allow us to make copies, we have consistently interpreted our own regulations differently and routinely require copies of documents in our investigations. Moreover, your proposal is impractical and unnecessary. Having to review

voluminous discovery materials on the defendant's schedule without the unrestricted ability to organize the information would substantially impair our analysis and delay the investigation. Indeed, you even concede, in denying any access to the database information, that review of voluminous information at the law firm "would be impractical." *Id.* And Harvard's proposal breaks with its past practice with the Department of Education; Harvard provided copies of documents for that Department's similar Title VI investigation in 1990.

In all events, the Department is willing to travel to your law firm or to Cambridge to copy and download all of the documents and information that the Department requested in the formats in which the Department requested them. Such an arrangement may reduce the cost in attorney's fees and time to Harvard. The Department, however, will not allow any such arrangement to justify further delays by you or your client.

The United States remains committed to conducting a full, complete, and fair investigation, and to working collaboratively with Harvard to achieve a just and appropriate resolution of this matter. To that end, the Department requested the existing *SFFA* suit discovery materials, which Harvard previously offered to provide, in an effort to alleviate the burden Harvard would encounter in responding to the Department's normal requests for information. Harvard has responded with delays, challenges to our authority to investigate, and a belated, unacceptable proposal to restrict our investigation. The Department hopes that Harvard will quickly return to its collaborative approach and voluntarily comply with the information requests and the investigation, which is in the best interest of all parties.

SUBJECT: Application of the Definition of Machinegun to "Bump Fire"

Stocks and Other Similar Devices

After the deadly mass murder in Las Vegas, Nevada, on October 1, 2017, I asked my Administration to fully review how the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives regulates bump fire stocks and similar devices.

Although the Obama Administration repeatedly concluded that particular bump stock type devices were lawful to purchase and possess, I sought further clarification of the law restricting fully automatic machineguns.

Accordingly, following established legal protocols, the Department of Justice started the process of promulgating a Federal regulation interpreting the definition of "machinegun" under Federal law to clarify whether certain bump stock type devices should be illegal. The Advanced Notice of Proposed Rulemaking was published in the Federal Register on December 26, 2017. Public comment concluded on January 25, 2018, with the Department of Justice receiving over 100,000 comments.

Today, I am directing the Department of Justice to dedicate all available resources to complete the review of the comments received, and, as expeditiously as possible, to propose for notice and comment a rule banning all devices that turn legal weapons into machineguns.

Although I desire swift and decisive action, I remain committed to the rule of law and to the procedures the law prescribes. Doing this the right way will ensure that the resulting regulation is workable and effective and leaves no loopholes for criminals to exploit. I would ask that you keep me regularly apprised of your progress.

You are authorized and directed to publish this memorandum in the Federal Register.





DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE TAKES ACTION IN RESPONSE TO BROWARD COUNTY SCHOOL SHOOTING

WASHINGTON – Attorney General Jeff Sessions offered his condolences and support for the people of Broward County, Florida yesterday. He also ordered the Department of Justice to assist the victims of the tragic shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School as well as the state and local agencies that are leading the investigation.

The Attorney General offered the following statement:

"It is now clear that the warning signs were there and tips to the FBI were missed. We see the tragic consequences of those failures.

"The FBI in conjunction with our state and local partners must act flawlessly to prevent all attacks. This is imperative, and we must do better. I have ordered the Deputy Attorney General to conduct an immediate review of our process here at the Department of Justice and FBI to ensure that we reach the highest level of prompt and effective response to indications of potential violence that come to us. This includes more than just an error review but also a review of how we respond. This will include possible consultation with family members, mental health officials, school officials, and local law enforcement.

"We will make this a top priority. It has never been more important to encourage every person in every community to spot the warning signs and alert law enforcement. Do not assume someone else will step up--all of us must be vigilant.

Our children's lives depend on it."

Following are some of the resources already deployed by the Department and available to assist with the state and local response:

- The FBI has approximately 250 personnel working on this matter, including personnel in Miami and at FBI headquarters in Washington, D.C.
 - The FBI's Evidence Response Team is assisting in evidence collection and analysis and providing technical assistance with phone and social media investigation.
 - The ATF dispatched 17 special agents from the Miami Field Division to assist at the scene, and these agents continue to support the Broward County Sheriff's Office in follow-up investigation.
 - 14 ATF agents from ATF's West Palm Beach and Fort Pierce Field Offices were on stand-by to assist during the scene response, and are now supporting the follow-up investigation.
- ATF completed an urgent trace of a recovered firearm through its National Tracing Center.
- ATF assisted in ballistics analysis through its National Integrated Ballistics Information Network, conducted witness interviews, and canvassed area federal firearms licensees for information that may assist the investigation.
- Numerous components of the Department have made their victim-witness coordinators available for victim and witness assistance as needed.
 - The U.S. Marshals Service has deployed eight personnel—four from the Florida/Caribbean Fugitive Task Force and four from the Southern District of Florida office. Additional personnel were staged and remain ready to respond if needed.
 - U.S. Attorney Benjamin Greenberg remains in contact with the state prosecutor and Broward County Sheriff's Office leadership and has made all federal resources available as needed.
 - Three Assistant U.S. Attorneys are currently assisting with the investigation, and one is staffing the FBI Command Post.
- Through the Antiterrorism and Emergency Assistance Program, the Office for Victims of Crime has funding available to support victim-assistance activities such as axis intervention and axis trauma soundaing and to

activities, such as crisis intervention and grief trauma counseling, and to reimburse victims for certain expenses related to the shooting.

 The Office for Victims of Crime and the Bureau of Justice Assistance stand ready to assist the state and local authorities.

This list should not be considered exhaustive. The Department of Justice will continue to do whatever it can to help the people of Florida at this difficult time.


